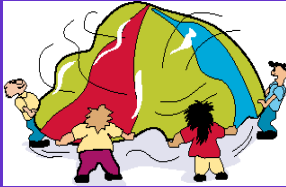

Young People & Open Spaces

A programme aimed at addressing social inclusion of all young people (0-19's) in Crosby through a mix of lottery funding and close partnership working. Projects include an all weather multi-sports facility, teenage youth shelters, pocket parks and a programme of play and activity sessions at existing community venues.

Lunchtime Activities

The project works in partnership with lunchtime support staff in local schools, in providing a wide range of play activities. Head teachers have commented that the number of behavioural incidents have reduced dramatically, because the children are positively engaged in play. There have been fewer incidents of misuse of play equipment and there have been improvements in classroom behaviour in the afternoons.

Multi-Use Games Area

- ◆ A floodlit multi-use games area has been sited within Sheffield Park. It is open access, and can be used all year round by young people free of charge. It provides a safe environment for young people to indulge in a range of play and recreational activities.
- ◆ Staff are currently providing a range of activities on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 4pm-6pm, weather permitting.



Pocket Parks

- ◆ Crosby is currently an area of high density housing with few open spaces which children can claim for their own play needs. To address these needs the project is in the process of developing three pocket parks, designed for children under 8 years of age.

Teenage Shelters



- ◆ The Project has provided one shelter at Sheffield Park and is in the process of identifying two additional sites. The aim is to create non-confrontational meeting places for teenagers.
