

## Interim Report to the Prime Minister An Ageing UK Population

### Background

The fastest growing age group in the UK population are those aged 80 years and over who currently constitute 4.5 per cent (2,749,507) of the total UK population. This age group has increased by over 1.1 million between 1981 and 2007 (1,572,160 to 2,749,507). For the first time ever this has resulted in more pensioners than under 16's. This trend is predicted to continue. The mortality rate for the population aged 80 years and over has fallen from 137 deaths per thousand in 1911-1915, to 83 deaths per thousand in 2006-2007 (Source: Office of National Statistics).

The dependency ratio is now of real concern - the ratio of the population that is not of working age compared with the sector of the population that is of working age.

An ageing population has consequences for government and business in terms of spending on such areas as health, social care, social security and occupational pension schemes.

Currently 40% of benefit expenditure and 29% of hospital and community health service expenditure is spent on those aged 80 years and over. These percentages are expected to continue.

A solution must urgently be found.

### Recommendations

40% of those aged 80 years and over could be targeted through phased extermination, commencing by the first quarter of 2010. A higher kill percentage than this would draw suspicion by members of the public. This extermination could, in part, eliminate the most dependant sector of the UK population.

The methods of the cull could be multi targeted to avoid any suspicion by members of the public. Methods could include:

Extermination by vehicle: 'White Van Man' is notorious as a dangerous driver - this could be capitalised upon by sending small fleets of Population Control vans into the local community to 'accidently' run over and terminate the target citizens (collateral damage should be expected with this method of control, however it could still be justified, as per Ministry of Control (MOC) Collateral Damage Guidelines 2001, as abridged 2006). Key identifiers of old age include (but not limited to): Zimmer Frames, walking sticks, grey hair, arched back, bobby hat, war medals and a smell of urine.

Residents could be easily terminated before their time by 'natural causes' and 'accidents', methods could include: inducing of heart attacks through the subliminal placement of images of scantily clad celebrities throughout the screening of Coronation Street, assisted slips trips and falls down stairs and the use of cyanide in some residents gruel (aka food).
